Please note that all tenants are also responsible for awareness and compliance to changes in environmental legislation which include but are not limited to the following:

- In August 2003 Environment Canada implemented regulations governing halocarbons in refrigeration and air conditioning systems under federal jurisdiction as described in the regulations. All tenants with cooling systems that meet the requirements under the regulation must ensure they are in compliance. The

- In June 2008 Environment Canada implemented regulations governing storage tank systems under federal jurisdiction as described in the regulations.
