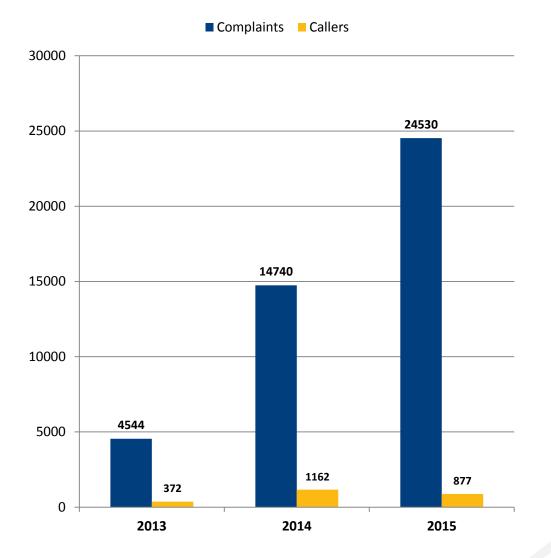
Noise Management

Complaints & Complainants 2013-2015

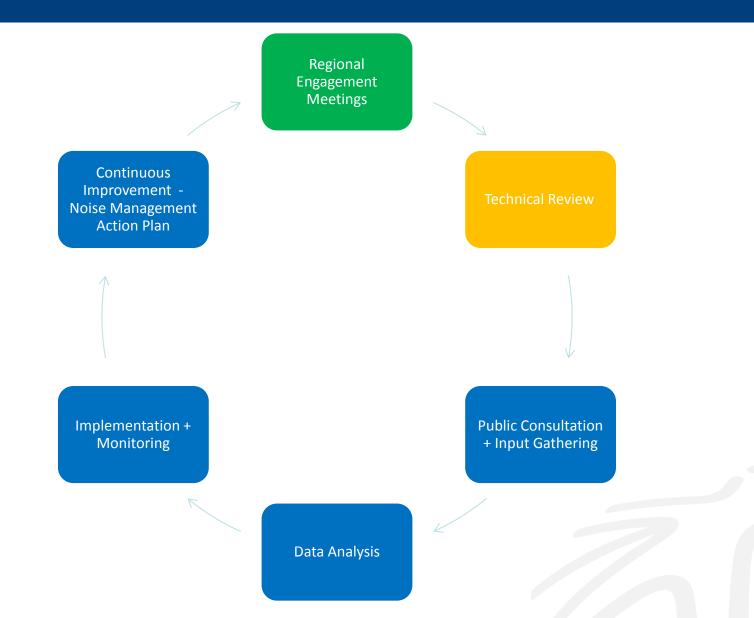


Pearson Noise Management Pearson Program

Airspace Change Protocol

In June 2015, NAV CANADA and the Canadian Airports Council published the Airspace Change Communications and Consultation Protocol



The protocol establishes a framework to ensure residents:

- Have the opportunity to know that a change may be taking place and why the change is necessary
- 2. Have the ability to learn and understand how the change may affect them, and
- 3. Are able to provide input that will be taking into consideration as part of the design process
