




## Passenger Traffic at Toronto Pearson (2009–2011)

## **New GTAA CEO starts March 19**

The GTAA's new CEO, Howard Eng, comes to us from the Airport Authority Hong Kong, where he was the executive director of airport operations since 1995, and formerly the vice president of operations at Edmonton International Airport, both with Transport Canada and with the Edmonton Airport Authority. He is a graduate of the University of Alberta with over 30 years of leadership experience, specializing in the development and delivery of guest experience strategies, and armed with a vast experience in developing global hubs.

#### **Air Services**

Since November 7, **Qatar Airways** has provided weekly Boeing 777 freighter service to Toronto Pearson, paying landing fees of approximately \$7,000 weekly.

Starting in March, **Turkish Airlines** increased service to Istanbul to four times weekly.

Starting March 27, **COPA Airlines** increased capacity on four-times-weekly Panama City service to their largest aircraft, the Boeing 737-800, resulting in an additional 144 seats per week.

**Caribbean Airlines** provides non-stop weekly service weekly to Grenada, in addition to their daily flights to Port of Spain, Trinidad, and Kingston, Jamaica.

Starting May 3, **Air Canada** will provide new service three times weekly to New York JFK with Canadair regional jets, while increasing the number of daily flights to New York LaGuardia.

Air Canada will also Increase summer service to Seattle to twice daily with Embraer 190 jets.

WestJet will add more services as follows:

- Kingston, Jamaica, three times weekly, starting April 30
- Aruba, weekly service, starting May 6
- New York La Guardia, eight times daily, starting June 4
- San Juan, Puerto Rico, weekly service, year round
- Santa Clara, Cuba, weekly service, year round

WestJet has begun code-sharing with both American Airlines and Delta Air Lines on services within Canada.

**American Airlines** will increase service to Chicago O'Hare to eight times daily for the summer season.

This summer **Sunwing Airlines** will expand its transatlantic charter program, adding service to Paris Orly, twice weekly; Glasgow, Scotland, twice weekly; and Barcelona, Spain, weekly. Returning routes include Amsterdam, twice weekly; Lisbon and Porto, Portugal, each weekly; and London Gatwick, four times weekly.

Sunwing will code share with Corsair on the Paris service and continues to code share with Arkefly on the Amsterdam service.

Between June 22 and September 10, German airline **Condor** will fly three times weekly to Frankfurt, returning to Toronto Pearson after many years.


## **GTAA** named Employer of the Year



# Noise Complaints and Callers (2009–2011)




## **Top Five Callers vs. All Other Callers** (2011)

#### Restricted Hours Flights (November-December 2011)





## **Early Turn Trial**

The trial program allowing early turns on the north/south runways and extended prop turn hours continues, and related complaints are minimal.

Throughout the trial from March 3, 2008, to December 31, 2011, 1,886 eligible jet aircraft (20 per cent) conducted an early turn off the north/south runways, resulting in six complaints. During this time, 2,253 props (93 per cent) conducted early turns between the hours of 6:30 and 6:59 a.m., while 2,915 (86 per cent) initiated early turns between 11:01 and 11:30 p.m., resulting in 28 complaints.




## **Comparison of Aircraft Movements and Noise Complaints by Runway Operation**

From January to December 2011, there were 423,891 aircraft movements at Toronto Pearson, resulting in 793 complaints, of which 383 were related to aircraft arrivals, 406 were related to aircraft departures, and four were unrelated to runway operations.
